HIGHLIGHTS 2023-2024


he Institute for Community Engaged Research (ICER) connects researchers from a diverse range of disciplinary backgrounds. We share a commitment to research that supports diversity, equity, and social justice. The Institute facilitates the participation of community members, organizations, students (both graduate and undergraduate, domestic and international), and academics in undertaking effective community engaged research. It is a hub for building relationships, collaboration, mentoring and effective knowledge creation and exchange.

The Institute continues to be a vibrant and vital hub for graduate and faculty community engaged researchers. However, we have learnt from, and retained some of the affordances of, hybrid delivery and online engagement, learned during the pandemic which now comprise of a permanent component of the Institute's activities. This annual report demonstrates ICER's ability to achieve its core mission - including developing strategic partnerships with international and national colleagues, continuing to develop closer relationships with students in the CESCE IGS theme, and working directly with our community partners on a range of projects. Furthermore, we continue to make a vital contribution to realizing the vision outlined in UBC's Strategic Plan, making the UBC Okanagan campus more resilient through strengthening its role in the local food system and contributing to developing cross-campus policies for addressing the climate emergency.

From July to December, I was on sabbatical. During this reporting period, Dr. Christine Schreyer served as the interim director of ICER. This Annual Report highlights the numerous new initiatives and events that Christine successfully launched and organized, which were well-received. Notably, Christine introduced the ICER Storytellers Series, inaugurating it with an interview with Dr. Leyton Schnellert. This series adopts an informal 'fireside chat' format, allowing our members to share the personal journeys that have shaped their research. Additionally, Christine organized a workshop on the pertinent and under-discussed topic of estate planning in the context of research. The seminar posed the critical question "What happens to your research, if something happens to you?" To address this, Christine convened a panel comprising legal, administrative, and research experts to explore the topic.

As many of you are aware, I will be stepping down as the director of ICER on July 1st, 2024. Following a search process led by the Office of the Vice Principal of Research and Innovation, we are fortunate to have Dr. Christine Schreyer accept the position. Christine brings a wealth of knowledge in Community Engaged Research from her extensive research program on community language revitalization and other language related projects, coupled with her experience serving as the interim director of ICER on two occasions. I extend my best wishes to her in this new capacity and look forward to continuing a close collaboration with the Institute in the future.

Another major change in the Institute is that Fiona McDonald will be stepping down as the Executive Editor of ICER press. Fiona has done a truly amazing job of building the Press 2.0 from the its inception. She departs leaving behind a strong foundation, including an accessible and beautiful website and a detailed set of procedures for submitting, reviewing, and disseminating community-engaged research. Thank you, Fiona! I will be taking over in the interim until the new director can fill the position with a permanent Executive Editor.



ACTIVITIES AND PROJECTS

Highlights for this past year include that ICER:

- Hosted the pre-talk social for visiting scholars Drs. Hunt and Farrales, who presented as part of the CCGS Speakers series: Reclaiming and Reorienting to Embodied, Collective Knowledges of Solidarity.
- Co-hosted a round table discussion with researchers from ICER, UBC Okanagan Library, and the UBC Public Humanities Hub (Okanagan and Vancouver) to discuss past achievements and future aspirations for community-engaged research and public humanities on our campus.
- We began to implement some of the strategies and goals identified in the document *ICER: Review and Strategic Priorities 2023 2028*.
- Supported the Local Food Champions project with Liz Blakeway (Land to Table), Dani Korven, Chef Brad and Kristen Thompson (UBCO Food Services), Dr. Mary Stockdale (UBCO), Casey Hamilton (Campus Health), Robyn Bunn (Community Service Learning), and work study students Ambu Once and Emily Rubooga.
- Helped facilitate the UBC Okanagan teach-in for Climate and Justice attended by over 100 participants.
- Hosted a Storymaps workshop led by Dr. Donna Senese along with graduate students Ayla de Grandpre and Sierra Lammi.
- Hosted three FASS Brown Bag Lunch Talks organized by Associate Dean, Alison Conway attended by over 70 participants.
- Hosted four FASS Summer URA workshops in ICER, and the URA Symposium in September.
- Hosted the FASS Graduate Review.
- Hosted two FASS Faculty Mentoring sessions.
- Co-hosted two Community Engagement Network (CEN) sessions with Kat Cureton, Donna Langille, Jenica Fisque and Angela Han.
- Presented the Starting a Conversation series with 5 speakers from April 2023 March 2024 attended by 80 plus community members, students, staff and faculty.

- Organized a welcome back open house at the start of the fall welcoming grad students, community partners, staff and faculty. And organized a holiday tea at the end of the fall semester.
- Developed and implemented a drop-in time (twice a week in the fall semester, and once a week in the winter semester) for students and ICER members to meet informally to network and discuss their research
- Continued the ICER Scholarship Program, awarding three UBC Okanagan Graduate Students \$1000 each.
- Showcased the work of ICER Faculty and affiliated students as one of the stops for visiting students during the Experience UBC Okanagan event in February which saw over 800 students visit campus.
- Co-hosted Language Sciences Institute: "Giving the Land Back its Spirits": Indigenous Place Name Reclamation, a Taku River Tlingit example. With Dr. Christine Schreyer and Tamis Cochrane. CEDaR (Community Engaged Documentation and Research) Relational Technologies Speaker Series.
- Responded to a conversation with graduate students by hosting a workshop on "how to do meaningful work in times of constant crisis?" attended by forty students, faculty and community partners.

OUTREACH AND COMMUNICATION

- Partnered with more than 31 community organizations and other research institutes.
- Hosted events that have been attended by more than 325 participants.
- We have continued to nurture relationships with other UBC Okanagan institutes and departments who work in the realm of community engaged research.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2024-2025

- We will welcome a new leadership team both in the Institute and at ICER Press.
- We will work with a new Work Study student to create and improve our knowledge mobilization in the form of podcasts and videos.
- We will continue to pursue excellence in Community Engaged Research and growing the Institute to include, represent and support researchers and community partners working in our fields of research.

ICER researchers work in communities around the globe and throughout the Pacific Rim. We maintain active affiliations with many partner organizations. We have sustained our commitment to strong research partnerships that support knowledge creation and exchange. Partnerships which in turn promote equality, equity, and justice at the local, national, and international levels. As this Annual Report demonstrates, these broad objectives are clearly represented in the activities that ICER has initiated, supported and facilitated over the past year.

Message from the Director of ICER Press

The ICER Press continues to be established with the best practices in peer-review, open access, and accessibility. We continue to be active in expanding its editorial office to include a team of amazing Editorial Assistants, Editorial Consultants, and collaborators. In 2023, we had another successful Work Study student that the press shared with ICER proper. During Summer 2023, Dr. McDonald hired Malorie Rusk as the ICER Press Editorial Assistant and Accessibility Advisor.

Work was put on hold in 2023 and 2024 on the nsyilxcən Language until Dr. Jeannette Armstrong wishes to advance that effort further. Future progress on the series requires a lot of care and cultural safety to ensure it meets the needs of the community and the language fluency programs.

In May 2024, Dr. McDonald prepared and launched the first peer-review process in the history of ICER Press. This was unique, too, as it was a Community-Peer Review effort. It was successful and has resulted in a beautiful and carefully crafted community report soon available on ICER Press website. Dr. McDonald also established the more traditional anonymous peer-review process using academic expertise from Canadian and international scholars. This has led to four new publications underway with ICER Press.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

This past year, ICER has directly engaged in and supported a number of important community initiatives and events. Among others, these include:

THE BIG, SCARY WHAT-IF: WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR RESEARCH, IF SOMETHING HAPPENS TO YOU?

This workshop provided preliminary information and guidance about a topic that many researchers don't immediately think about-what happens to your research, should something happen to you? What steps can be taken to ensure that our obligations to community are fulfilled in terms of data management and record keeping? And what are the processes that are activated by the university should the occasion arise?

To help answer these questions we had a panel including Michele Bjornson (FASS Admin and Operations Manager), Paige Hohmann (Archivist with UBC Okanagan Library), Julia Norman (lawyer with Pushor Mitchell), and Dr. Christine Schreyer who shared ideas and issues worth considering for anyone doing community engaged research. We hope to follow up with a working circle for those interested in



participating in "shut-up and plan" sessions, as well as an info session on research data storage for community engaged research.

HOW TO DO MEANINGFUL WORK IN TIMES OF CONSTANT CRISIS

In October 2023, CESCE MA students Fabiola Melchior and Sierra Lammi initiated a conversation with Dr. Christine Schreyer and Joanne that resulted in a facilitated discussion in early November about how to do meaningful work in times of constant crisis. We invited a panel of scholars, those working in non-profits and students about the challenges and value of continuing to do work during a time when the challenges facing the world are multiple and urgent. Forty people gathered together to share food and discussion of this important topic.

HOW TO DO MEANINGFUL WORK IN A WORLD OF CONSTANT CRISIS

- NAVIGATING FEELINGS OF GUILT AND DESPAIR

How does one navigate the often slow, or long-haul process of academia, writing and policy work, with the sense of urgency and immediate action required to address issues we're facing?

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TEACH-IN FOR CLIMATE AND JUSTICE

On March 12, 2024, 100 UBC Okanagan faculty, staff and students came together for a dialogue on climate and justice research and an open space on climate action in the UBCO community. ICER members helped facilitate and promote the event, as well as present on their research. Two of our members, Bill Cohen and Mary Stockdale, delivered the opening addresses. This initiative directly supports the UBC Okanagan Climate Action Plan 2030, which establishes a course of action to accelerate the reduction of core operational emissions by 2030 and also identifies measures to deal with issues of climate justice.

OUTREACH ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

We have continued to support community outreach through a series of engaging projects and events.

VISITING SCHOLAR JORDYN HRENYK: SUPPLANTING THE CORE: INDIGENOUS BEADING AS ARTS-BASED RESEARCH ANALYSIS



Indigenous beading analysis is an arts-based research method, based on the protocols of Indigenous beading. It is a form of embodied inquiry, in which the beader/researcher is encouraged to work slowly, to attend to processes of meaning-making, and to harness the creative potential of surprise. Through this method, a researcher seeks out the 'core' of the research story, and builds findings around it, just as tree rings form around a core. As a research method, Indigenous beading analysis enables one to come to and to convey research findings – often to audiences beyond typical, academic audiences.

Bio: I am a Michif (Métis Nation Saskatchewan) researcher and PhD Candidate in the area of Business and Society at the Beedie School of Business at Simon Fraser University. My research is focused on Indigenous entrepreneurship and values-aligned business. I specifically study how Indigenous entrepreneurs build mutually-supportive networks through their organizations.

Working with new ICER member, Dr. Adam Saifer, UBCO Faculty of Management, we provided support for visiting scholar Jordyn Hrenyk, and were delighted to host her presentation in March, 2024.

STARTING A CONVERSATION SPEAKER SERIES

The Starting a Conversation series is an opportunity for ICER members and affiliates to share their research ideas, methodologies, questions or findings with an interested audience of students, peers and community members in a relaxed and collegial atmosphere.

Because of this relaxed and engaging format, there is an increasing demand from our membership to use the series to showcase research being done by our faculty, graduate students and community partners. In 2023-2024, ICER hosted five speakers as a part of the series.

- Fernanda Novoa. "My community-based research journey: Navigating research, advocacy and allyship with the community Mexican migrant agricultural workers in the Okanagan." Starting a Conversation. Institute for Community Engaged Research, UBC Okanagan. February 29, 2024.
- Sierra Lammi. "My community based research journey: Exploring the impacts of climate change using participatory mapping at the University of British Columbia Okanagan."Starting a Conversation. Institute for Community Engaged Research, UBC Okanagan. March 19, 2024

Each discussion was held in a hybrid format and was attended by up to 31 students, staff, faculty and community members. This



year we were also delighted to welcome a class from Yukon University who joined us for Cara Basil's Starting a Conversation. The hybrid model offers flexibility and we will continue with this format. This year 80 participants attend the talks, a 29% increase from last year.

WEBINARS

We continue to develop our hybrid and virtual webinar format and take the experiences learned during the pandemic to both increase the number of attendees, and also improve the accessibility and experience for those attending the events virtually.

CER STORYTELLERS SERIES


This year ICER launched a new initiative the Community Engaged Research (CER) Storyteller's Series. The series is designed to accomplish three objectives: 1) Provide an intimate in-person opportunity for students, community members, staff, and faculty to come together, meet and learn from the experiences of a seasoned CER researcher. 2) To showcase the wisdom and knowledge of some of the outstanding CER researchers at UBC Okanagan and learn about their journey to becoming community engaged researchers. 3) To document these events for permanent record and make them available on our website and the ICER Press website.

The first storyteller's series was held in ICER in October and saw Dr. Christine Schreyer in conversation with Dr. Leyton Schnellert. Dr. Leyton Schnellert is an Associate Professor



in UBC's Department of Curriculum & Pedagogy and Eleanor Rix Professor of Rural Teacher Education. His scholarship attends to how teachers and teaching and learners and learning can mindfully embrace student diversity and inclusive education. Dr. Schnellert is the Pedagogy and Participation research cluster lead in UBC's Institute for Community Engaged Research (ICER) and co-chair of BC's Rural Education Advisory. His community-based collaborative work contributes a counterargument to top-down approaches that operate from deficit models, instead drawing from communities' funds of knowledge to build participatory, place-conscious, and culturally sustaining practices. Dr. Schnellert has been a middle and secondary school classroom teacher and a learning resource teacher K-12. His books, films, and research articles are widely referenced in local, national, and international contexts.

Then in April, we held the second CER Storyteller's Series event with the FEELed Lab at the Woodhaven Ecoculture Centre. This event saw Dr. Jon Corbett in conversation with Cree scholar, Dr. Shawn Wilson.

NETWORKING ACTIVITIES AND FUNDING

ICER exists to enhance university and community engagement. Partnerships include activities such as joint research projects, funding agreements, student supervision, and knowledge exchange.

LAND TO TABLE PARTNERSHIP : STUDENT LOCAL FOOD CHAMPIONS

Dr. Mary Stockdale and the ICER team collaborated with the Land to Table network on a FeedBC grant from May 2023 to April 2024. Land to Table is dedicated to fostering a thriving, sustainable, and accessible local food system. The grant facilitated the involvement of two students, Ombú Ance and Emily Rubooga, in a project that aimed to increase student awareness of the significance of supporting local food efforts. Working alongside the Community Service Learning program, UBCO Food Services, and various local organic producers, the students helped to promote a broader understanding of the food value chain on our campus through a series of events and initiatives that promoted local food.

This chain encompasses the journey from farmers to processors, distributors, food services, and ultimately, consumers. The initiative also sought to address and surmount the obstacles faced in local food procurement.



ICER GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

2023-24 saw ICER continue its commitment to supporting students in their pursuit of community engaged research through its student scholarship program. This year the program provides three graduate students with a \$1,000 research fellowship to help them undertake their graduate research.

Congratulations to **Denica Bleau, Dante Carter** and **Bonny-Lynn Donovan** the 2024 recipients of the Institute for Community Engaged Research award.

Denica's research focuses on the project Indigenous Land-based healing from the effects of Criminalized and Institutionalized Trauma. She is supervised by Dr. Gabrielle Legault.

Dante's research is titled Nanâtawihowin (Healing & Finding Place) Through Indigenized Economic Development. She is supervised by Dr. Gabrielle Legault and Dr. Onyx Sloan Morgan.

Bonny-Lynn's work is called *Ecoliteracy in the Early Learning Years: A Land Education Study with Syilx Children*. Co-Supervised by Dr. Leyton Schnellert and Dr. Jeannette Armstrong

In addition to offering students financial support, scholarship recipients are also invited to talk about their research during the Starting the Conversation lunch-time speakers series. Students can chose to give a paper presentation, discuss their methods or findings, or undertake some other form of public engagement with ICER's membership.

We look forward to hearing about their community engaged research projects later in the year.
